After securing the truck's hazardous waste cargo, their highly skilled team brought in a mobile crane to lift the cab so rescuers could free Jack and get him to a hospital.




Without Ash-Rand, Jack would likely not have survived the accident.






One Day at a Time

The American Red Cross Disaster Team faced a huge challenge when eight families lost their homes in an apartment building fire.

MERCE uses your United Way donations to provide diabetic screening and treatment for uninsured or underinsured patients.




Bad Secrets
